Dinah Katherine Miles Somerville was born on August 7, 1953, the fourth of nine children of Mary Artina Dotson Miles and the late Joseph Edward Miles. Dinah grew up in St. Mary's County, Mechanicsville, Maryland. She received her education from the St. Mary's County Public School System and graduated from Chopticon High School, Class of 1971. She married Charles Webster Somerville and from that union two children, Charles Webster, Jr. and Damion Edward Somerville were born. Dinah also was blessed with four grandchildren; Lexus, Charles III, Krystalee, and Landon. Dinah spent her life serving family, building the community, and as federal government public servant, for over 30 years. Despite not seeking a college degree

of her own, it did not discourage her from wanting the dream for her children, and other community students. It was her passion to celebrate faithfully Black History and to establish a scholarship for family and other community youth seeking to further their educational goals. The family is honored and proud to have established a posthumous scholarship fund and the continued yearly black history celebrations honoring the legacy of Dinah K. Somerville.

St. Mary's County Black History Coalition (SMCBHC) and the Dinah K. Somerville Scholarship Fund (DKSSF) was established on July 31, 2011, by family and friends with a shared interest. SMCBHC-DKSSF is a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) status, Employer Identification Number 37-1645880. SMCBHC-DKSSF's goal is to help deserving individuals within our community achieve their career goals, an objective which has the added benefit of bettering the St. Mary's County community-at-large. In short, our goal is to ensure that no deserving scholar in our community will be deprived of higher education because of a shortage of funds. SMCBHC-DKSSF is committed to fundraising to provide scholarships to assist with higher education tuition cost and celebrating black history every last Sunday in February. In addition, she will share her experience as an artist and how she secured a recurring TV role, as the smart and sassy Stacey Smith in the hit show, The Chi on SHOWTIME.

You will be graced with The Black Arts Generations Fashion Show and a scene on the History of Step Shows from the St. Mary's Ryken High School Black Student Union; and, Howard University Students and the Harmonies of Faith Gospel Group will serenade us with their musical selections. DJ Hollywood will provide selections of hip-hop music from 1970 to 2024. The program will conclude with "The Dinah K. Somerville Scholarship Fund" award honorees accepting their awards.

We are committed to continuing the name sake's legacy, by building the community through scholarships for our future young leaders. SMCBHC's mission is to help desiring individuals, within our communities, with financial support to defray the costs of higher education. This objective has the added benefit of bettering our community-at-large. Investing in our young leaders' future will ultimately result in a better world. Presidential Proclamation on National Black History Month, 2024

Issued on: January 31, 2024

This National Black History Month, we celebrate the vast contributions of Black Americans to our country and recognize that Black history is American history and that Black culture, stories, and triumphs are at the core of who we are as a Nation.

The soul of America is what makes us unique among all nations. We are the only country in the world founded on an idea. It is the idea that we are all created equal and deserve to be treated with equal dignity throughout our lives. While we still grapple today with the moral stain and vestiges of slavery — our country's original sin — we have never walked away from the fight to fully realize the promise of America for all Americans. Throughout our history, Black Americans have never given up on the promise of America. Unbowed by the forces of hate and undaunted as they fought for centuries against slavery, segregation, and injustice, Black Americans have held a mirror up to our Nation, allowing our country to confront hard truths about who we are and pushing us to live up to our founding ideals. They have helped redeem the soul of our Nation, ensuring the promises in our founding documents were not just words on a page but a lived reality for all people. In the process, the vibrancy of Black history and culture has enriched every aspect of American life.

Since taking office, the Vice President and I have worked to continue this legacy of progress and lay down a foundation for a stronger, more equitable Nation. On my first day as President, I signed a historic Executive Order on Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government. In February 2023, I signed an additional Executive Order to acknowledge the unbearable human costs of systemic racism and to direct the entire Federal Government to advance equity for those who have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by persistent discrimination, poverty, and inequality, including the Black community. That includes building an economy that grows from the middle out and bottom up, not the top down. So far, we have created over 14 million jobs and in 2023, the Black unemployment rate was lower than in any other year on record.

We are addressing historic health inequities for Black Americans by making systemic changes to our health care systems that increase healthcare access while lowering costs. Today, more Black Americans have health insurance than at any previous time in American history. We are working to address the Black maternal health crisis — ensuring dignity, safety, and support for Black moms. The Vice President has helped elevate this critical issue to a national priority by calling on States to extend Medicaid postpartum coverage from two months to one year.

My Administration is also working to close racial gaps in education and economic opportunity. To that end, we have delivered over \$7 billion in funding for Historically Black Colleges and Universities and are working to expand access to home-ownership — a major source of generational wealth for families — while aggressively combating racial discrimination in housing. Our update to the Thrifty Food Plan is keeping 400,000 Black kids out of poverty every month and making sure millions more have enough food to eat. By 2025, we are working to ensure that 15 percent of Federal contracting dollars goes to small disadvantaged businesses, including Black-owned small businesses. We are also replacing poisonous lead pipes so every American can turn on a faucet at home or school and drink clean water.

To deliver equal justice under the law, we are appointing judges to the Federal bench who reflect all of America, including Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson and more Black women to the Federal circuit courts than all previous administrations combined. I also signed a historic Executive Order that implemented key elements of the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act: banning chokeholds and restricting no knock warrants by Federal law enforcement, creating a national database of officer misconduct, and promoting effective and accountable community policing that advances public trust and safety. I also signed the first major gun safety legislation in nearly 30 years as well as a long-overdue law to make lynching a Federal hate crime in Emmett Till's name. My Administration continues to call on the Congress to pass the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act and the Freedom to Vote Act to secure the right to vote for every American.

Today, I am reminded of something Amelia Boynton said when reflecting on her march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge on what would be known as Bloody Sunday: "You can never know where you're going unless you know where you've been." America is a great Nation because we choose to learn the good, the bad, and the full truth of the history of our country — histories and truths that we must preserve and protect for the next generation. This National Black History Month, as we remember where we have been, may we also recognize that our only way forward is by marching together.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOSEPH R. BIDEN JR., President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim February 2024 as National Black History Month. I call upon public officials, educators, librarians, and all the people of the United States to observe this month with relevant programs, ceremonies, and activities.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this thirty-first day of January, in the year of our Lord two thousand twenty-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and forty-eighth.



2024 BLACK HISTORY THEME: AFRICAN AMERICANS AND THE ARTS

African American art is infused with African, Caribbean, and the Black American lived experiences. In the fields of visual and performing arts, literature, fashion, folklore, language, film, music, architecture, culinary and other forms of cultural expression, the African American influence has been paramount. African American artists have used art to preserve history and community memory as well as for empowerment. Artistic and cultural movements such as the New Negro, Black Arts, Black Renaissance, hip-hop, and Afrofuturism, have been led by people of African descent and set the standard for popular trends around the world. In 2024, we examine the varied history and life of African American arts and artisans.

For centuries Western intellectuals denied or minimized the contributions of people of African descent to the arts as well as history, even as their artistry in many genres was mimicked and/or stolen. However, we can still see the unbroken chain of Black art production from antiquity to the present, from Egypt across Africa, from Europe to the New World. Prior to the American Revolution, enslaved Africans of the Lowcountry began their more than a 300-year tradition of making sweetgrass baskets, revealing their visual artistry via craft.



The suffering of those in bondage gave birth to the spirituals, the nation's first contribution to music. Blues musicians such as Robert Johnson, McKinley 'Muddy Waters' Morganfield and Riley "BB" B. King created and nurtured a style of music that became the bedrock for gospel, soul, and other still popular (and evolving) forms of music. Black contributions to literature include works by poets like Phillis Wheatley, essays, autobiographies, and novels by writers such as David Walker and Maria Stewart. Black aesthetics have also been manifested through sculptors like Edmonia Lewis and painters like Henry O. Tanner.

Iln the 1920s and 30s, the rise of the Black Renaissance and New Negro Movement brought the Black Arts to an international stage. Members of the armed forces, such as James Reese Europe, and artists such as Langston Hughes, Josephine Baker and Lois Mailou Jones brought Black culture and Black American aesthetics internationally, and Black culture began its ascent to becoming a dominant cultural movement to the world. In addition to the Harlem Renaissance, today we recognize that cities like Los Angeles, Chicago, and New Orleans also were home to many Black artists.

The 1960s continued this thread through the cultural evolution known as the Black Arts Movement, where artists covered issues such as pride in one's heritage and established art galleries and museum exhibitions to show their own work, as well as publications such as *Black Art*. This period brought us artists such as Alvin Ailey, Judith Jamison, Amiri Baraka, Nikki Giovanni and Sonia Sanchez. The movement would not have been as impactful without the influences from the broader Black world, especially the Negritude movement and the writings of Frantz Fanon.

In 1973, in the Bronx, New York Black musicians (i.e. DJ Kool Herc and Coke La Rock) started a new genre of music called hip-hop, which comprises five foundational elements (DJing, MCing, Graffiti, Break Dancing and Beat Boxing). Hip-hop performers also used technological equipment such as turntables, synthesizers, drum machines, and samplers to make their songs. Since then hip-hop has continued to be a pivotal force in political, social, and cultural spaces and was a medium where issues such as racial violence in the inner city, sexism, economic disinvestment and others took the forefront.

The term Afrofuturism was used approximately 30 years ago in an effort to define cultural and artistic productions (music, literature, visual arts, etc.) that imagine a future for Black people without oppressive systems, and examines how Black history and knowledge intersects with technology and science. Afrofuturist elements can be found in the music of Sun Ra, Rashan Roland Kirk, Janelle Monáe and Jimi Hendrix. Other examples include sci-fi writer Octavia Butler's novels, Marvel film *Black Panther*, and artists such as British-Liberian painter Lina Iris Viktor, Kenyan-born sculptor Wangechi Mutu, and Caribbean writers and artists such as Nalo Hopkinson, and Grace Jones.

In celebrating the entire history of African Americans and the arts, the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) puts into the national spotlight the richness of the past and present with an eye towards what the rest of the twenty-first century will bring. ASALH dedicates its 98th Annual Black History Theme to African Americans and the arts.

Anah Ambuchi is a 16yr old Kenyan American actress, writer, producer, and director who is the one to watch. In he r acti ng career her extrovert personality landed her TV commercial credit with name brand clients such as Nickelodeon, McDonald's, Build-A-Bear, American Girl Doll, Amazon, BuzzFeed, Baskin Robbins and countless others, plus a recurring TV role as the smart and sassy Stacey Smith in the hit show The Chi on SHOWTIME.

In her filmmaking career, Anah has already made a name for herself at such a young a young age. At 11yrs old Anah wrote, produced, and directed her award-winning short film titled *Made in His Image* which is based on her bullying experience. *Made in*

His Image went on to win a total of 4 awards and was accepted into 12 national film festivals and made its international debut during the Cannes Film Festival where Anah received the inaugural Rising Star Award. Anah has been able to use her film *Made in His Image* to speak to over 3,000 plus young boys and girls at national and local non-profit organizations, and public schools to encourage them to love themselves no matter what others may say or think, to spread love, support one another and stick up for others who are being bullied.

To top it off at the age of 15 years old she earned her <u>first</u> network TV producer credit on a film titled "*A Christmas Wish*" which aired on BET and BET+.

Anah is also an anti-bullying advocate mentoring over 30 young black girls with the Saving Our Daughters Organization which was co-founded by actress KeKe Palmer. Black Girls Rock class of 2021 and 2022 and a recently named Disney Dreamer Class of 2024. Anah is also an active member of the African Artist Association, Young Artist Academy and serves as the Youth Advocate for Women of Color Unit (WOCU). Anah is also a youth jury member for the Chicago International Children's Film Festival and youth jury member for the Diversity in Cannes Short film Showcase.

Anah is truly honored and humbled for every opportunity that she is given. She aspires to use her platform to encourage young girls of color to follow their dreams no matter the obstacles and challenges they may face. She once met Alfre Woodard who reminded her that good is possible and to always encourage and uplift one another, especially women and girls of color. She aspires to do exactly that as she believes she is being used for a purpose that is bigger than her. Anah lives by the motto that "Her Dreams Are Valid."

Meet Joshua R. Lamont, Dinah's Nephew





As a teaching artist, fundraiser and arts advocate, Joshua was selected as a 2020 Emerging Arts Leader Los Angeles and a recipient of the 2021 California Arts Council Individual Artist Fellowship.

She is a Communications Intern for Save A Girl Save A World and an Ambassador for the Girls Who Brunch Tour, and has held leadership positions with Charles County NAACP Youth Council - Vice President and St. Mary's Ryken President of Student Council during her senior year.

She's been a believer in creating what you don't see, and her dedication to initiating change and supporting equality is the legacy she will continue building for herself and others every day. As a motivational speaker, she provides inspiration to captivate audiences by delivering multi-platform messages at conferences, seminars, and workshops. Sydnie recently had the opportunity to be a guest speaker at the Steve & Marjorie Harvey Foundation "Girls Who Rule The World" Retreat in Atlanta, GA, and the Girls Who Brunch Tour in Baltimore. While at the events, Sydnie kicked off her initiative called "You Are Enough," where she asked over 100 phenomenal black women to write letters of encouragement for girls at the event. She gifted each girl at the retreat with an affirmation letter, and gratitude jar, and the response was so sympathetic, it brought many of the girls to tears of joy. Sydnie is motivated to continue to push representation matters and build a platform that is inclusive of everyone's needs. This May, Sydnie accepted The Little Mermaid challenge, raised \$7,000 through a GoFundMe, and provided 200+ girls with the opportunity to see themselves on the BIG Screen starring Halley Bailey in Disney's Little Mermaid. Most recently, she had the honor of co-authoring You Can Go to College for Free! under Dr. Rhea Watson, the scholarship doctor, and it is now a best-seller on Amazon!
